SUMMARY OF THE BILATERAL COOPERATION WITH THE CITY OF AKUREYRI (ICELAND) AS PART OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROJECT "LIVE, RESIDE, WORK IN JELENIA GÓRA!"

IN THE YEARS 2023-2024

The project "Live, Reside, Work in Jelenia Góra!" received funding totalling EUR 3.89 million, provided by Iceland, Liechtenstein, and Norway through the European Economic Area Financial Mechanism (EEA FM) for 2014-2021, the Norwegian Financial Mechanism (NFM) for 2014-2021 and funds of the state budget.

The main objective of establishing bilateral cooperation with a partner from the Donor State was to exchange experiences and good practices and transfer knowledge between local government units.

The City of Jelenia Góra and the City of Akureyri (Iceland), in the framework of the implementation of the project "Live, Reside, Work in Jelenia Góra!" on 25.01.2023 concluded a bilateral cooperation agreement in areas jointly selected by both partners.

OBJECTIVES AND DIRECTIONS OF COOPERATION

1. GEOTHERMY

One of the issues identified in the diagnosis for the City of Jelenia Góra is the deteriorating air quality. The city authorities recognize that an excellent opportunity to enhance environmental quality lies in the utilization of renewable energy sources, notably the exploitation of existing geothermal water resources within the city. Concurrently, leveraging local energy sources presents the advantage of making the heat supply system less susceptible to price fluctuations of other energy carriers. Despite being in its infancy, geothermal heating in Jelenia Góra is seen as a promising avenue for development. The city's long-term development strategy includes the establishment of a geothermal heating plant, which would facilitate the extraction of thermal water for heat supply purposes. Collaboration with a partner from Iceland would greatly aid in the optimal advancement of geothermal energy in Jelenia Góra, offering invaluable expertise and models for reference.

2. GREEN URBAN TRANSPORTATION

Jelenia Góra was interested in expanding knowledge on practical aspects of obtaining and using bio-methane in municipal transport power, based on Akureyri's experience.

3. YOUTH PARTICIPATION IN COMMUNITY LIFE

The cooperation intended to exchange experiences and ideas on the active engagement of young people in the social life of their city. One area of collaboration involved an investment within the framework of the "Live, Reside, Work in Jelenia Góra!" project, named "Scena Młodych" (the Young Stage) – the establishment of an open-air stage on Jelenia Góra's Błonia. This initiative encompasses the conception, design, and implementation of a stage in a green area near the centre of Jelenia Góra. The Young Stage is intended to serve various cultural, social, and recreational purposes, specifically tailored to and co-created by the young generation of Jelenia Góra residents.

4. DIGITIZATION OF PUBLIC SERVICES

The City of Akureyri expressed interest in exchanging experiences and ideas on how to undertake the digitization of public services to meet public expectations and enhance government efficiency.

THE COURSE OF COOPERATION

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The initial study visit to Akureyri occurred from June 25th to July 3rd, 2023, involving the participation of 10 high school students from Jelenia Góra alongside two supervisors – a Town Hall employee and a high school teacher. During their visit, the students engaged in community workshops focusing on topics such as the social involvement of young individuals, fostering tolerance, and addressing peer violence prevention. Additionally, they collaborated with counterparts from Iceland, Norway, Sweden, and Denmark in theatre, music, and choreography workshops, culminating in a collective theatrical performance.



From September 28th to October 2nd, 2023, Jelenia Góra hosted a group of 10 young people from the Icelandic city of Akureyri, along with two supervisors.

The Icelandic youth and students from secondary schools in Jelenia Góra who had participated in the visit to Akureyri in June 2023 engaged in various activities.

- These included a community workshop focusing on the role of youth in social life in both Poland and Iceland,
- ► A guided tour in Jelenia Góra,
- Workshops on creating jewellery through fusing techniques and costume design, choreographic workshops, music workshops,
- A visit to the Nature and Education Centre of the Karkonosze National Park – Pałac Sobieszów
- Culinary workshops in the Technical and Industry Schools "Handlówka" – learning how to make "pierogi" (dumplings).

On November 14–15, 2023, a delegation from Jelenia Góra City Hall, comprising five employees led by Mayor Renata Kwiatek, along with representatives from municipal companies MZK sp. z o.o. and Termy Cieplickie, totalling three people, participated in a study visit to Akureyri.

During the visit, the ongoing work of the working groups initiated during the visit of the Icelandic delegation to Jelenia Góra was continued. Discussions centred around the respective plans of both cities regarding the digitization of services for citizens, as well as the sharing of experiences and addressing common challenges encountered in the digitization processes.

Additionally, the delegation visited the headquarters of a municipal company, Norðurorka, which primarily focuses on serving residents and businesses in the processing and distribution of hot water and drinking water, electricity distribution, and sewage management. During the meeting, discussions revolved around various topics, including the Icelandic side's experiences with utilizing thermal waters, particularly regarding geothermal heating for public buildings and private properties.

The delegation also had the opportunity to get acquainted with the functioning of the municipal composting plant, where biomethane is derived from municipal bio-waste. This bio-methane is utilized, among other purposes, as fuel for public transport buses.

Visitors also gained insights into the operational framework of the city's cultural institutions, including the HOF Cultural Centre. In addition to hosting concerts and theatrical performances, the centre accommodates a local music school and a recording studio within its premises.





The HOF Cultural and Conference Center facilitated a meeting with a representative of the EIMUR association, which spearheads projects aimed at enhancing resource utilization in the northern part of Iceland.

As part of bilateral cooperation of the project "Live, Reside, Work in Jelenia Góra!", four study visits were organized – two to Jelenia Góra and two to Akureyri.

These visits provided young people from both countries with the opportunity to discuss their involvement in social life, participate in city management, and contribute to its development. They also served as a platform for dialogue, where cultural similarities and differences were observed, and friendly relations were established, which persisted beyond the conclusion of the project.

Moreover, the study visits of city representatives served as a forum for exchanging knowledge and experiences in municipal management, as well as sharing best practices for addressing challenges encountered in local government structures and enhancing the quality of life for residents. It is anticipated that this cooperation will endure beyond the conclusion of the project.





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
